After the performance Hannah asked us to make a circe, and we did some acting warm up exercises. We copied the actors' moves and then we made up our own ones.

It was a bit busy when we got there. It was big inside, and the staff were nice and friendly.

We showed the staff the Time Out vouchers on our phone and they said we could choose from chicken shawarma, ch ssic beef and power på nt koshari.



Jess showed them our order on a piece of paper. Shaheen, Kamrul Jess, Fathema and Sharif had beef and Tajber had chicken. Dawud had the power pa nt koshari as it was

vegan. We made a mistake with one it did fill us up. of our orders and the staff kindly made us another bowl



The staff put our food into bowls and asked us if we wanted tahini, tomato sauce or a spicy sauce and crispy fried onions. Shaheen asked if they could put all the different sauces in her bowl

We had to wait 3 minutes for our food to come, they made it quicky for us and we sat downstairs to have our food.



We thought the food was nice, it was something new for us. The food was very spicy, some of us didn't I ke the tahini or the raw onions. Most of us thought the food was del cious even though it was our first time trying it.

The tour was realy nice. We I ked b oking at the picture of where the old Globe was, visiting the different parts of the theatre and the stage.

After the tour we had L nch in the café. it was busy but we managed to sit down.

After L nch, we watched Taming of the Shrew. We sat on the seats at the bottom at the back of the theatre, people who brought the cheapest tickets stood near the stage in the middle, there was no roof above them, and they got wet when it rained.

We thought the ph y was awesome especially watching the different actors perform. We at o I ked the puppets they used because they were realy funny.

It was fun to watch, and it made us a ugh a b t! The funniest bit was when one of the actors was drunk and he spie d his drink on someone. It was a very funny pay, but we didn't understand al of it. For the tour it usualy costs £27 and for tickets to the show tickets cost from £25 - £75 but if you buy standing tickets, it is a b t b ss around £5-£10. We got our tickets for free.

Staff at the Globe were awesome, friendly, kind, fantastic, great and heþ ful, they made us feel web ome and comfortable and very happy. We would recommend it for people who I ke Shakespeare and theatre.

We don't think the pay would be suitable for child ren because there is some bad a nguage in it.

We would go again because we realy enjoyed the show, it was amazing and funny. We would definitely I ke to there again to see more shows.

We had to book some individual tickets because you could only book a few in one go on the website. Our tickets were for 12.30pm but they e t us in earl er.

We went to the café to have our L nch but there was a probe m, the a dy said we could n't sit there because we didn't buy it from there. Any food we bought we had to buy as a group with one card, they would n't e t us pay individualy . The food was very expensive, so we had L nch in the corridor next to the outside area near the café.

After L nch we went into a secret room cab d the Pyx Chamber. Then we went inside the Chapter House. It had stained gb ss windows, medieval tib s and there were some rel gious pictures on the wal



After that we went inside the main build ing. There were paintings, statues, people sitting down, b ts of tombs and more stained gla ss and artwork. Queen Mary I is buried in the Abbey. Before we left we b oked at the Coronation Chair for the king or queen when they become the monarch.

We I ked looking at the pictures, information about peope and the

artwork on the was . We I ked the statues of peope on the tombs. We as o I ked b oking at the chair. It was fun looking around. The staff in the Abbey were nice and friendly, they didn't make us wait.



We were not happy that we could n't have our L nch in the café and we didn't think the staff there were nice. We didn't I ke eating in the corridor.

It was busy at Westminster Abbey, there were b ng queues to see some things and we had to wait.

We would go again but not during the school hol days and next time we wil have our L nch before we go.

It is usualy £30 for adut s to go but for people with disabil ties it is free and for people on Universal Credit it is £1.

On the other side of the ship, we b oked at the Master's Room. There was a pantry with a monkey in it, a toib t, a room with a big tabb with a chandel er on top to put your drinks on. Then we went to see the steering wheel to move the ship.



We took the I ft back down to have L nch in the basement café. It was in a big hal At the other end there were lots of figureheads from other ships.

When we got to the café a b dy tob us we could n't eat our packed L nch by the café and then she changed her mind. The food at the café was nice but there wasn't a b t of choice of food.



We I ked using the steering whee, pb ying the interactive games, and we liked looking at the different cob ured tea crates.

We didn't I ke wak ing in the rain on the top deck and nearly bumping our heads when we were going up and down the stairs, the stairs were very steep.

There were I fts there but on the top deck a wheet hair would not be able to go right to the top.

We thought it was a value for money for £2 because there was b ts to do there. If we had to pay ful price, we would n't be able to go because it is too expensive.



We would go again because it was amazing, and we want to see the figureheads and bunks again. We as o want to pay with the interactive activities and to have L nch in the cafe.
